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Bonn Climate Conference Advances Paris Agreement Implementation Ahead of COP31

Key policies: *Paris Agreement, UN Climate Change Conference (COP31), EU Climate Diplomacy, Global Stocktake, Climate Technology Framework, European Green Deal*

The latest round of **United Nations climate negotiations** concluded in **Bonn, Germany**, after ten days of technical discussions focused on advancing the implementation of the **Paris Agreement** and preparing the ground for the **31st UN Climate Change Conference (COP31)**, which will take place in Türkiye later this year.

Representatives from nearly **200 countries** participated in the annual mid-year climate conference, working to translate previous international climate commitments into concrete action while identifying areas requiring further progress before COP31.

Throughout the negotiations, the European Union worked closely with international partners to strengthen implementation of existing commitments, advance global climate cooperation and reinforce confidence in the multilateral climate process.

Focus shifts from commitments to implementation

A central theme of the Bonn conference was the transition from climate pledges to practical implementation.

Discussions concentrated on how countries can accelerate delivery of their national climate commitments and translate the outcomes of the **first Global Stocktake** under the Paris Agreement into concrete policies and investments.

Negotiators emphasised that achieving global climate objectives now depends increasingly on effective implementation rather than the adoption of additional commitments.

Progress across key negotiation areas

Delegates made technical progress in several important areas of the UN climate agenda.

Negotiations advanced work on:

- Just transition
- Climate technology cooperation
- Transparency and reporting
- Improving the effectiveness of the UN climate process

Countries also agreed that the **Climate Technology Centre** will continue to be hosted by the **United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP)**, ensuring continued international support for the development and transfer of climate technologies.

These outcomes contribute to strengthening the institutional framework supporting implementation of the Paris Agreement.

Strengthening transparency and accountability

Transparency remained a key focus throughout the conference.

Participating countries exchanged experiences on reporting progress towards their climate commitments, helping improve accountability and build confidence among Parties to the Paris Agreement.

The discussions reinforced the importance of transparent reporting systems for monitoring emissions reductions, tracking implementation and assessing collective progress towards global climate goals.

Climate finance and resilient development

Alongside the formal negotiations, governments, financial institutions and technical experts discussed ways to mobilise greater investment for climate action.

Topics included:

- Attracting private investment
- Strengthening national climate finance frameworks
- Supporting climate-resilient development
- Improving financing for mitigation and adaptation

These discussions recognised that scaling up climate finance remains essential for enabling countries to implement increasingly ambitious climate policies.

New initiatives ahead of COP31

Several new initiatives were presented during the conference to support faster implementation of global climate commitments.

These initiatives focus on:

- Accelerating national climate plans
- Strengthening international cooperation on mitigation and adaptation
- Developing practical implementation roadmaps
- Supporting the transition towards climate neutrality

The incoming **COP31 Presidency of Türkiye** also outlined its priorities for the conference, placing particular emphasis on practical implementation and solutions-oriented cooperation.

Among the proposals presented was the **"35x35 Electrification Target"**, an initiative that the European Union has indicated it will examine closely and engage with during preparations for COP31.

Looking ahead to COP31

Work on outstanding negotiation issues will continue over the coming months through technical consultations, political dialogue and international engagement.

The period leading up to COP31 is expected to focus on:

- Building trust among negotiating parties
- Bridging remaining differences
- Advancing technical negotiations
- Strengthening implementation of the Paris Agreement

The European Union reaffirmed its commitment to working with international partners to deliver meaningful progress through both negotiated outcomes and practical climate action on the ground.

Background

The **Bonn Climate Conference** is the annual mid-year meeting of the subsidiary bodies of the **United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC)**. It provides an opportunity for Parties to advance technical negotiations, review implementation of the **Paris Agreement** and prepare decisions for the annual **Conference of the Parties (COP)**.

The 2026 conference brought together representatives from nearly **200 countries** and focused on accelerating implementation of existing climate commitments ahead of **COP31** in Türkiye. Discussions covered just transition, climate technology, transparency, climate finance and international cooperation, while reaffirming the importance of translating global climate ambitions into concrete action. The outcomes of the Bonn conference will help shape negotiations later this year as countries continue working towards the objectives of the Paris Agreement and global climate neutrality.
